



From Our Pastor

The Season of Lent

On Wednesday, February 13, at both noon and 7 pm, we begin our celebration of the season of the Church Year called Lent. It is a time when we meditate on the work of redemption which Jesus accomplished for us on Calvary, in the spilling of His innocent blood. Lent offers the opportunity for confessing our sins and repenting of them. It is a season for rejoicing in the sacrifice our Lord made for us and for all sinners so that we could be free from guilt and condemnation, and free to serve our God with thankful hearts.

Listed below is our schedule for midweek worship during Lent, at which time we will meditate on the topic "Jesus of Nazareth is Passing By," and consider how we may properly respond to a visit by our Lord Jesus:

Ash Wednesday, February 13 (noon & 7 pm) Luke 18:35-43 "He's calling for you." How did blind Bartimaeus react when he heard that Jesus was passing by?

Thursday, February 21 (7 pm) Luke 22:39-47a "What prophets and kings longed to see." What was the response of the disciples as Jesus prayed in Gethsemane?

Thursday, February 28 (7 pm) John 18:1-27 "Facing the enemy." What was the attitude of the soldiers who arrested Jesus?

Thursday, March 7 (7 pm) Mark 15:1-15 "His verdict and our own." How did Pilate speak to the King of the Jews?

Thursday, March 14 (7 pm) Matthew 27:27-44 "He is your King" Why did the people insult Jesus as He hung on the cross?

Thursday, March 21 (7 pm) Luke 23:26-31 "Why me?" How did Simon of Cyrene respond when he came face-to-face with the Savior?

Holy Week: **Palm Sunday, March 24** (9 am) "Worship at the Cross"

Maundy Thursday, March 28 (noon & 7 pm) John 13:18-30 "He knows your heart." What was Judas' reaction when Jesus called him to repent of his sin?

Good Friday, March 29 (noon) Luke 23:39-43 "He stands at the door and knocks." Why did one thief have a change of heart after he talked to Jesus?

Good Friday, March 29 Tenebrae (7 pm)

Easter Sunday, March 31 Sunrise (7 am)

Easter Sunday, March 31 Song Service (9 am) Luke 24:13-32 "Abide with us, Lord." How did the disciples from Emmaus respond to their risen Lord?

As we consider our theme for Lent, it gives us opportunity for soul-searching and faithbuilding. How do we respond to Jesus - with indifference, anger, fierce opposition, abject fear, humility, overwhelming joy, grace-inspired service? Learn both good lessons and bad from some of the people who met Jesus as He carried out the critical work of rescuing sinners from eternal death.

Jesus of Nazareth is passing by. Please take time this February and March to gather in God's house to worship our Savior. Don't let this opportunity to grow in faith pass you by.


God wants you to know what you might have suspected all along. He does know all about you. He observes that you need someone to whom you can pour out your heart, and He is willing to be that one.

Great Need. Great Opportunity

Pastor Robert Smith, who serves on a committee helping to oversee WELS mission work in Latin America, reports on a recent trip to Haiti.



The highlight of the trip was seeing about 25 orphans baptized. Missionary Terry Schultz and National Pastor Rona baptized the young children; I had the privilege of baptizing one of them. We rejoiced, as did the angels, at so many new children of God! We have great spiritual opportunities in Haiti. We have already baptized around 200 children in Haiti. Worship services will be conto help imple- to help imple- to help imple- to help implement the translation of more outreach materials into Creole.

At one orphanage we saw the fish pond supplied by WELS donations. We could see the fish swimming around; they will soon be big enough to eat. We also met with various orphanage directors who came together at the orphanage. They had an opportunity to ask questions and make comments. They asked about WELS mission work in Latin America. A key step is to start holding worship services in the Leogane area. Pastor Rona has started making arrangements for a monthly worship service to be held in the new year. We also saw a need for more instructional materials. In Leogane we visited two orphanages. One of the orphanages did not have much for buildings or things for the orphans. As I was walking around, I came across the cooking area. I saw the wooden pieces of a bed, and the headmaster explained that they had to use this wood because they didn't have anything else to cook with. I believe that there is a great need for us to supply more and better food to the orphanages, and for us to arrange more visits from WELS nurses. We continue to take steps to make sure that our donations are providing for basic necessities in addition to Christian instructional materials. Wisconsin Church Destroyed by Fire

The little white country church stood amid the farms and fields for 99 years, and many in the congregation spent their whole lives worshiping there. So on Saturday night, Jan. 12, when a gas explosion and fire destroyed St. John's, Colfax, Wis., many felt they lost a piece of their own history and the community lost a landmark.

Thankfully, nobody was in the building at the time of the explosion. Six area fire departments helped to battle the blaze well into Sunday morning. According to local news reports, nothing appears to be suspicious, but the fire is still under investigation at the time of this writing.

Rev. John Toppe, pastor at St. John's, says many in the congregation are shocked, but not in despair. "It's tragic, but we will go on, because we know God's promises where he says he will make all things work for our good," says Toppe. The church building was insured, so the congregation will be able to rebuild. St. John's members will be able to worship at St. Paul's, Ridgeland, Wis., which is about 20 miles away and also served by Toppe, until they find a place to worship in the Colfax area. Christian Aid and Relief has contacted the congregation to offer assistance should it be needed. More information is available at weau.com.

Letter from the Lutheran Mobile Clinic 12/2012

Krismasiya Bwino!

I hope this letter finds you happy and healthy! I am glad to say that I am now quite healthy after a few weeks of not being so. It seems that I had a virus that was making me ill, but it has now run its course. I am so thankful that Maria was here to keep things running smoothly when I was unable to do much more than get out of bed.

I wish I could tell you that we have a functioning borehole at our clinic in the village of Thunga, but we still have not been successful with that. Two weeks ago, the driller made an attempt but was not able to find any water at a depth of 55 meters. For various reasons, such as equipment breakdown and hard rains causing impassible roads, we will wait. We hope that soon after the Christmas holiday they will be making another attempt. For now, we continue to pray that we will have a borehole that functions all year (including the dry season) very soon.

The kwatcha has continued to devalue slightly. Diesel costs about \$7 a gallon right now. Because the dollar is strong compared to the kwacha, it is helping the Lutheran Mobile Clinic, but the Malawians are feeling the fuel cost acutely. We are occasionally unable to find diesel for a week but then the next week it is available again. The Malawi president has stated that she does not see any problem with the fuel situation, but when talking to the average Malawian, there is much frustration.

The number of patients we are seeing in our clinics is on the rise as usual for this time of year. We are seeing lots of patients with malaria and upper respiratory infections. Epilepsy continued to be in our top five diagnoses for November and I expect it will be the same in December. This has been a year full of blessings for LMC! We have a wonderful, caring and competent staff. We are also blessed with excellent temporary staff that fills in for our staff during illnesses and vacations. We have Pastor Mabedi who leads devotion at our Mwalaulomwe Clinic on Thursdays and competent laymen that lead devotions at our Chiwamba Area clinics. We were always able to get to our clinic sites. We've enjoyed the support of our mission family who encourage us and lend a listening ear. Have a Merry Christmas and a Blessed New Year! Kari & Maria

Tuesday & Thursday – Our Tuesday morning study meets in the "chapel room" from 9-10 am. A duplicate of our Tuesday class, Thursday morning class meets at the

Lakeshore Restaurant from 9-10am. Men and women of all ages and Bible knowledge are welcome.

Confirmation-Level 1 Confirmation is a brief study of the Old & New Testaments. The course, "From Promise to Glory," uses an interactive DVD to make learning visual, stimulating, and fun. The class is an overview of the Bible's history, walking the students through God's promise of salvation in the Garden of Eden, to the glorious home in heaven for which we are preparing. Level 1 is for first year Confirmation students and is meeting on Mondays at 6 pm.

Level 2 Confirmation is our "traditional catechism class." Designed to be more in-depth, this class takes the students deeper into the doctrines, or teachings, of God's Word. We study the chief parts of the Bible as outlined in Luther's Catechism. Level 2 is for 2nd and 3rd year students and meets on Wednesdays at 6 pm.

PeaceMakers- PeaceMakers is a support group for those whose loved ones have gone to heaven. Participants share their cares and concerns with each other. Gathering around the Word, we consider how Jesus conquered death and gives us eternal life. The purpose of this group is to encourage Christians that: 1) through faith in Jesus, death is the door to heaven, 2) we are not alone in our sorrow, and 3) Christians are here to support each other. PeaceMakers meets in Pastor's office on the 2nd & 4th Wednesdays of every month at 1 pm. Sunday School-Sunday School is where you'll find the younger sect of our congregation. We offer classes for all children, 2 years old through 8th grade on Sunday mornings, September- May, at 10:15 am.

4th Sunday Teens- This teen Bible Class, led by Victoria Hill, is designed for all teens, 7th-12th grade, and meets on the fourth Sunday of each month, September-May from 10:15-11:15 am. This class deals with a variety of every day life situations in a hands-on, practical way. For more information on any of the Bible Classes offered at Peace, or for current topics, please talk to Pastor Riedel.

I would like to thank everyone for their prayers and financial gifts to prevent Peace from going over a "fiscal cliff". With God's blessings on the offerings received through January 6, we not only avoided borrowing money, but we also paid back all we owed to our designated funds. This puts us in a good position to meet our budgetary needs for 2013. To do this, though; our offerings will have to average \$3634 a week, slightly more than they averaged last year.

Finance Committee

The function of the Finance Committee is to count the weekly offerings, along with any other money that comes into the church, and deposit the money into the church's bank account. The envelope amounts are then entered into a computer database that keeps track of all members offerings for the year. The end-of-year offering statements are then generated from this program.

The weekly money counting teams consist of the Financial Officer and the Money Counters. The Counters separate the loose money from the envelopes, open envelopes and makes sure the amount on the envelope equals the amount in the envelope; they add up the amount of loose money and envelope money. The Officer adds up the envelope total and makes sure it equals the amount of money taken out of the envelopes, endorses any checks, makes out the deposit slip, and deposits the money at the bank.

Please see page 3 for a list of Counters & Officers. The Finance Committee is headed by the Financial Secretary. The duties of the Financial Secretary include entering weekly offerings into the database, generating weekly and monthly reports for the Treasurer and any other reports that may be needed by the council, generating year-end offering statements, ordering envelopes and distributing those envelopes to members. 
Greeting Card Counter
