How Can I Put Myself in Your Place?

A companion was assigned to the crown prince to take punishment in his place. Since only a king could discipline his son, his surrogates were stuck when the monarch went away on business and the heir to the throne acted out. Enter the *whipping* boy. He bore the brunt of his royal buddy's mischief. The hope was that a friend's suffering would prick the conscience of the future king and curb his unruly behavior. Here's what I don't get. It was an honor to take a beating on behalf of a naughty prince.

That kind of servitude seems absurd today. In a tit-for-tat society, people receive what they have coming to them one way or the other. So we make assumptions about people and their lot in life. We are tempted to screen for worthiness before we help. But followers of Jesus appreciate that being a servant is, by definition, unfair. God proved it. The ruler of everything saw what we needed. God begot something of himself in our place. He wasn't deterred by the fact that we brought misery on ourselves. He was intent on altering the consequences and giving us a new life. Jesus served by sacrificing himself for all people. That changed everything for you and me. It saved us and made serving others essential to the Christian way of life. It begs us to ask, how can I put myself in your place? How can I make things better for you?

The opportunities are everywhere. Children are poor. Older folks run out of resources. Mere acquaintances share the same living space just to get by. Mental health issues are prevalent. The disabled live isolated from the rest of the community. People look a little desperate. This is not some far-off land. This is the neighborhood I walk every day and maybe yours too. On bad days we just want to take care of our own. On better days we insist that someone should do something.

I know. Getting tangled up in someone else's neediness is scary. But it's what servants do. Never underestimate the difference we can make by showing up, because the alternative for some folks is nothing at all. Doing right by them is a delicate matter. We are talking serving; not rescuing, accusing, or bossing around. Their dignity is already in tatters. Approaching them with humility, kindness and respect can thaw the chill that exists between people from different worlds. When suspicion dissolves and trust forms, we can roll up our sleeves and have the privilege of putting ourselves in their place and making things better for them. And because so few people are really acquainted with Jesus, our service can be a very nice introduction.

But, please expect Christian service to be a one-way street. Some acts are voluntary and some get compensated. Some are celebrated and others go unnoticed or are quickly forgotten. None of that matters. What makes serving others so liberating is that there is nothing in it for us. There's no hidden agenda. There's no expectation of a payoff. There are no strings attached. Yet, large or small, acts of service are deeply satisfying because they fulfill what our Lord ordained us to be. "We are to God the pleasing aroma of Christ among those who are being saved and those who are perishing" (2 Corinthians 2:15).

Serving others is all about honoring our King.

The Aftershock

You don't have to live near the San Andreas Fault in California in order to have experienced an earthquake. In the last 30 days (March and the end of February), over 8,000 earthquakes of varying magnitude have shaken a number of places around the world, 5 of which were registered as significant.

It is not always the earthquake itself that presents the greatest threat, however. Often it is the aftershock, or vibrations in the ground after the initial tremors, that inflicts even more of an impact on people and communities.

Let me tell you about one historic earthquake. To say that this quake "rocked the world" is a bit of an understatement. Perhaps it is more accurate to say that the earthquake which took place in Jerusalem around 30 AD shook the history of this world, and its aftershocks continue to be felt to this day.

You will find the report very interesting:

Matthew 27:50-54 (NIV1984) ⁵⁰ When Jesus had cried out again in a loud voice, He gave up His spirit. ⁵¹ At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom. The earth shook and the rocks split. ⁵² The tombs broke open and the bodies of many holy people who had died were raised to life. ⁵³ They came out of the tombs, and after Jesus' resurrection they went into the holy city and appeared to many people. 54 When the centurion and those with him who were guarding Jesus saw the earthquake and all that had happened, they were terrified, and exclaimed, "Surely He was the Son of God!"

To many in our world, the fact that the Son of God died while secured with nails to rough, wooden beams on a hill outside of Jerusalem is uninteresting, at best. But to Christians, this single event in history is one of the most important happenings of all time. Christians correctly understand this as the almighty LORD of the universe sacrificing His only Son to pay the ultimate price for human sin and guilt. Jesus Christ suffered the agonizing pain of hell as He hung on Calvary's cross for those three awful, unnaturally dark hours.

It bends all human reasoning completely askew to consider how God the Father could abandon God the Son on that day we rightly commemorate as Good Friday. But know this and believe it: Jesus suffered and died for you, dear reader. His blood was spilled for your sins. Trust in Him as your Savior. Believing in Him as the Lamb of sacrifice, the guilt and shame you have amassed against God's holy demands have been erased. With blood. Christ's holy blood. For the blood of Jesus, God's Son, purifies us from all unrighteousness (1 John 1:7).

What a monumental, history-shaking moment. The LORD's promise to defeat the devil and to eradicate the power of sin had finally come to fruition. The impossible list of Old Testament sacrifices was neatly and perfectly completed in this one, absolutely faultless offering. The old evil foe was crushed. The curse of sin was paid. Peace with the Almighty had been won. This was demonstrated in the miraculous shredding of the mighty curtain in the Temple, as our Savior willingly gave up His final breath. That tall and wide and heavy curtain which separated the priests from God's presence in the Most Holy Place (the Holy of Holies), for the very first time, stood open. What a picture of peace! What a wondrous display of the powerful accomplishment achieved by Christ in His death. We now have been reconciled with the almighty God through the blood of Christ. Heaven is our home through faith in Jesus Christ. "For the dwelling of God is with men. He will live with them (Revelation 21:3)."

The earthquake which rocked Jerusalem to its core was followed by a powerful aftershock. The graves of dead Christians were opened and they were raised to life, given another opportunity to witness to this world's only Savior. And a ranking Roman soldier, who witnessed the horrifying yet strangely comforting events on Calvary, confessed with his lips that this Jesus was not just another condemned criminal: "Surely He was the Son of God!"

After the earthquake, the aftershocks continued to shake hearts and lives. Many who had initially rejected Jesus' testimony, later believed in Him after He rose from the grave. Even some of the brazen religious leaders who had so violently opposed Him, calling for His death by crucifixion, later confessed Jesus Christ as their Lord (Acts 21:20)!

More than that, this strong, wise, loving God came to earth in the person of Jesus Christ. The all-powerful God came in human weakness to rescue us from sin and death. He was condemned and crucified. Weakness, right? No! Strength! Jesus used his strength to remain on that cross until every last sin of ours

had been paid for. His empty tomb proves it. "Jesus was declared with power to be the Son of God by his resurrection from the dead" (Romans 1:4). Death has been defeated! The guilt of sin before God has been removed! By trusting in Jesus, life in heaven is waiting for us.

Need more strength? The One who created the earth has it. The One who died and rose for you has it. He is the One who gives us the strength to face each day with fresh confidence. Find that strength in his Word. And then be ready to soar. Be ready to soar on eagles' wings with renewed strength! Be ready to soar on eagles' wings through every challenge of life! Be ready to soar on eagles' wings to the home that Jesus has prepared for you in heaven!

He is risen (Matthew 28:6)." Jesus lives! For you. And He is preparing a home in heaven for you and for everyone who clings to Him in

The aftershock of Jesus' death and resurrection will continue to shake hearts and lives until He returns in glory.
