Fourteen years ago, my then-boyfriend surprised me by flying from Kodiak Island, Alaska (his home), to Milwaukee (my home), to ask me to marry him. We had met through friends via e-mail about 15 months before, and, crazy as it sounds now, we only visited in person seven times before we were married. Would I do it all again? Absolutely! Will I freak out a little if my daughters try this? Undoubtedly!

In our early years of marriage, we often had a "tell me one thing I'm doing well and one thing you'd like me to work on" conversation. We had nightly devotions and prayed long prayers. As often happens when schedules get busy or kids are born, we were lucky to have a conversation that didn't include the word *diaper*, much less have serious conversations about our marriage.

As I think back to the day Greg proposed, I still love him and am thankful that God gave me the man I needed. At the same time, I'm reevaluating how much intentional energy I've been putting into our marriage and wondering how to build an even better one. So I asked friends for their marriage advice and wanted to share it with you.

My favorite gem comes from a woman whose marriage has weathered the death of a child, cancers, ill parents, a bone marrow transplant, and heart attacks—a marriage that will celebrate its 49th anniversary this August. Her advice? "The grass is always greener where you water it."

With that, I share 15 ways to help us all water the grass on our side of the fence.

- 1. Build your marriage with God as the solid foundation--this is the most important one!
- 2. Nag God, not your hubby. Yes, your bathroom has been under construction since last Thanksgiving, but praying about supporting your husband in his everyday life will get you much further than asking him daily when he's going to finish.
- 3. Don't go to bed mad. Do go to bed at the same time. Have "pillow talk" between just the two of you. Learn about each other as you grow and change.
- Pray for each other every day. Pray together often.
- 5. Do a chore you don't like--yes, even cleaning the toilet shows you care.
- 6. Leave love notes in odd places--in a jacket pocket, in the car, in a wallet or purse.
- 7. Learn each other's love language and "say" I love you in that language. Doing the dishes for your spouse might seem like a great way to say I love you, but when their love language is quality time, they'd rather have dirty dishes in the kitchen and you next to them on the couch.
- 8. Diligently protect your marriage from infidelity. Don't spend enormous amounts of time with a member of the opposite sex. Guard your heart.
- 9. Work more on your marriage than you did on the wedding. That was just a day; this is for a lifetime.
- 10. Plan date nights. No, I don't mean going to the grocery store together. A real date.
- 11. Listen when your spouse talks to you. Listening means being attentive, responding when asked, not judging, not interrupting, being fully engaged.
- 12. Give lots of grace, just like you get from God every day.
- 13. Write down five ways that you see God working through your spouse and show them your list. Say thank you!
- 14. Hold hands in public so much your kids get uncomfortable.
- 15. Model a loving, healthy relationship for your kids. You have the biggest influence on the husband or wife they're going to be someday.

Hours on Saturday are taken up by home improvement projects or needed maintenance. By the end of it all we are tired.

Finally it is Sunday morning, a day of rest and I get to sleep in. It is the one morning that if I don't get out of bed, my work will not call and my children will not bother me. Nothing much happens on Sunday morning so it is a good time to relax. I get so tired during the week. I need more rest and Sunday seems to be the perfect day to get it. If I sleep in on Sunday morning, I may be well rested physically but spiritually I am exhausted.

On the front wall of the church where I grew up is this Bible passage. "Come to me all you who are weary and burdened and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). Those are Jesus' words. It is his invitation to provide rest, not for our bodies but for our souls. There were plenty of times I walked into that church physically tired, but I always received rest for my soul.

I heard a message about my sin and Jesus' forgiveness. I was reminded every time that I had real rest in Jesus. I had the rest of a clear conscience because Jesus took my sin away with his death and resurrection. I had the rest of knowing that when I die I will rest eternally with Jesus. I had the rest of knowing that the same Savior who loved me enough to die for me is ruling all things in this world for me and for the benefit of all his people.

Such a busy life! It makes you wish you could have more rest. You do! In Jesus you have the rest you truly need. The church may not have that Bible passage printed on the wall, but through the Word of God you hear, you will receive rest for your soul in Jesus. Next Sunday morning, come and get some rest with us at church. It is good for your soul.

#### Dear Friends of Lutheran Girl Pioneers,

Christians around the world have just celebrated Easter. Yet, there niggles at the edge of my mind, an awareness of those in the world around me who don't have the joy or comfort of Easter's victory. There are so many lost souls battling to survive; drowning in despair, lost in hopelessness. Without faith in Jesus they will be lost for all time. And I think of God's Word found in Romans 10:13-14, *"Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved. [But] how, then, can they call on the One they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the One of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them?"* 

That question is directed, however, not only to those in the public ministry. It's for you and me, as well! Lutheran Girl Pioneers is a ministry-tool that can help congregations do so, in a friendly, educational way that is non-threatening and fun.

LGP exists as a para-synodical organization, meaning it receives absolutely no funding from WELS. It relies on registration dues and donations from outside sources. In addition to the many hundreds of volunteers of this ministry, you can share in the call to reach out with the Gospel's message. n these difficult times we are counting on you to help.

There are three ways you can do so. First, your prayers are most important. Second, you can volunteer in your own congregation or district. Faithful women are needed to serve as mentors and teachers. Third, we humbly implore you to set aside some of your financial resources to this ministry. Registration dues remain at \$18 per girl per year. With this year's membership at 1,574 girls, that gives us an amount of only \$28,332.00 raised. That money must go towards rent, utilities, the Executive Director's salary, and other operating expenses. You can see how much we rely on our friends to help with this ministry. #### WELS Christian Aid and Relief responds to Oklahoma Tornadoes



WELS Christian Aid and Relief is ready to respond to the devastating tornado wreckage in Moore, Okla., after the storm on Monday, May 20.

Mr. Mark Vance, Christian Aid and Relief director of operations, has already been in contact with Rev. John Strackbein, pastor at Holy Cross in Oklahoma City. Early reports have confirmed that no members have lost their lives, but at least three families have completely lost their homes. Meanwhile, many others still are waiting to return to their homes after they evacuated to friends' and families' houses.

Vance traveled to Moore to determine the best ways for Christian Aid and Relief to help. An initial \$5,000 already is being wired to the congregation to help with initial needs, such as water and clothing. Vance says, "What we're going to do in Oklahoma is sit down with the congregation and the members who have been affected and see how we can help them in the recovery process—whether it's financial, helping them rebuild their homes, clear debris, whatever it might be. Then, we'll look at whether the church can do the same thing as a help to the community."

Vance will also visit the Fort Worth, Texas, area where tornadoes struck earlier in May to meet with pastors there who are looking for guidance for ways to help their community.
