

The Cure for Common Sunburn



Well, it's summertime. I bet you can imagine mom's advice as you head outside to enjoy the warm weather. Like mom, I would suggest that you be careful not to stay in the sun too long. Make sure you drink lots of fluids, avoiding beverages with caffeine and alcohol. It is easy to overheat your body and dehydrate yourself in the summer sun. If you do soak up too much of the sun's rays, I offer you some practical advice on dealing with sunburn. Avoid irritating the burned

skin. You may try applying a cool, wet compress to your "warm" sunburned spots. Check out www.prevention.com for ideas on simple home remedies for sunburns. They suggest a variety of kitchen foods that can help you treat burned skin, including oatmeal, skim milk, and tea bags.

There is another kind of burn that commonly affects us all. Whether you spend your time inside or outside, have pale or dark skin, are susceptible to sunburn or not – it doesn't matter. By nature every human being, including you and me, deserves to be burned by the Lord in everlasting shame and contempt. Our personal sins, however trivial they might seem to each of us, separate us from a holy and righteous Judge.

In the second psalm, King David bemoans the fact that peoples and nations incessantly plot to undermine the almighty God and His promised Savior. We witness their conspiring in our day as atheists attempt to silence the voice of Christians speaking freely of Jesus, supporters of the homosexual agenda attempt to redefine God-pleasing marriage into a perverted and wicked union of same-sex couples, and pro-abortionists attempt to soft-pedal the legalized murder of human infants. Their attempts are futile. There is no one who can supplant our Triune God. He is the King of His creation. Whoever refuses to bend a humble knee to the Lord will feel the heat of His wrath in the Judgment.

Kiss the Son, lest He be angry and you be destroyed in your way, for His wrath can flare up in a moment.

Blessed are all who take refuge in Him.

Psalm 2:12 (NIV1984)

What can we do? The psalmist not only warns us about the fiery destruction of Son-burn which befalls all who reject the Savior - who will soon return to judge the living and the dead. He also points us in the direction of the only cure: humble repentance and faith in Jesus Christ.



Kiss the Son. A kiss is an expression almost exclusively reserved for those who love each other deeply – a married man and woman, parents and children, the closest of friends. We love our Friend Jesus because He loved us first (1 John 4:19). He demonstrated His love for us this way: Christ died for the ungodly (Romans 5:6). The ungodly - that's me and you and everyone who has ever or will ever live on this earth. The Son of God came to rescue a world of sinners from the wages of sin. He saved us from death and hell by His sacrifice on the cross. With humble and believing

hearts, we approach the Son, not to be burned in His wrath, but to receive in Him the forgiveness of our sins and refuge from the attacks of the devil. We find refuge in Jesus from the punishment our sins deserve. We have peace in God's Son, who assures all who rely on Him alone for the salvation of their souls, will enjoy a home with Him in paradise. Our lives of faith, our meditation in His Word, our devotion to the One who loved us first is our kiss – our expression of love to Jesus our Savior.

During the summertime we might turn into sun-worshipers, enjoying a little too much sun. Beware of the burn.



During the summertime we might also be tempted to slip into a casual, even lazy, attitude in regard to our time spent worshiping our Lord. Beware of the burn. Contemplate the mystery of Christ's love for you and flee the temptations of the sinful flesh, which only lead to a path of destruction and fiery hell. Run to the Lord in faith and love. Feed and nourish your faith with God's Word and Sacraments for an eternal future with Him in heaven. Jesus alone keeps us safe from the burn. Blessed are all who take refuge in Him.

A Short Story

I Need More... SECURITY:



Everyone knows disappointment sooner or later. It's that time when the car broke down, when national security was breeched, when we lost our job. It's that time when doctors couldn't cure us or our loved ones, our investments disappeared, friends disappointed us, or when we disappointed ourselves.

We try to limit disappointment or prevent disappointment from becoming a disaster. We make promises. We buy insurance. We do our homework before making big decisions. We search for what is "guaranteed or your money back." We go to the doctor recommended by trustworthy friends.

What we're really looking for is security. We just want something we can count on; something that is stable; something that is safe and stays that way. But isn't it striking that even with all the protection agencies, certifications, types of insurance, promises, and money-back guarantees in today's world, we're still left searching for more security?

When it comes to things that can threaten our sense of security, the possibilities appear endless. You probably have had that sinking feeling and said to yourself, "There's always something. What am I supposed to do? If it's not one thing, it's another. Either *this* or *that*..."

At such trying times, find strength from these verses in the Bible: "I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:38-39).

Notice: "neither" this, "nor" that "will be able to separate us from the love of God..." The love of God is a faithful, stable and dependable love. And if we want proof of that, we need only consider how God sent his only Son for us. Jesus came and died on the cross, and he rose again. Our sins weren't too much for him to bear. Death itself could not hold him in his grave. Satan could not stop him from carrying out his mission. Many religious leaders hated Jesus. One of his own disciples betrayed him. One denied him. The rest abandoned him. And the vocal majority crucified him. Did any of these prevent Jesus from keeping God's promise to save us? No! God's love prevailed for the whole world, and now whoever believes in Jesus has eternal life!

God's love will never disappoint you. Nothing in all creation can separate you from God and the power of his love in your life. For Jesus came, he died, and he rose again. We have this as our security: **God's love is guaranteed.**







Witnessing on the Web

If Jesus were alive today, which one of his disciples would manage his Facebook page? It may seem like a far-fetched idea, but con-



sider this—YOU are Christ's disciple, called to faith in him through the Holy Spirit and given eternal life through his death and resurrection. Does your online profile reflect that you are a child of God? The Internet, as a tool, can be used for a lot of sinful, harmful, evil things. It's a platform where people can get together and, in their earthly way, condone one another's sinful behavior. The Internet makes people anonymous, allowing for hateful comments about people and society. It's a tool for bullies, making it easier to torment others, while they cowardly hide behind a screen. Social media makes connecting easier, but it makes real relationships more remote. It's a powerful tool for bad. But it's a powerful tool for good, too! Instead of tearing someone down, offer compliments. Instead of complaining or gossiping, "like" your church, or a charity. Make the extra effort to share kind words or a smiley face with someone who may be going through a tough time. While so many unkind and vile words and ideas can be shared online, so too, can messages of kindness, and more importantly, the message of salvation through Jesus. Think of all the connections you have through social media online. How many of them do you actually know? How many of them know you know Christ? Most importantly, how many of them know Christ? Think of all the people who see your daily comments and "likes." Each time you post something to the vast internet world, it's an opportunity to tell that world the most important thing: We are all redeemed through Christ, who took our place on the cross. Through Christ, we are all forgiven, and by faith, we are heirs to eternal life. Wow. That message sure beats, "Ugh. Math homework" as a status update.

"So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God." 1 Cor. 10:31 Does your online life reflect your life in Christ? Whether you "post" or "like" or whatever you do online, do it to God's glory.

Looking for a great series? Try the five books in the Redemption series by Karen Kingsbury. This series follows the lives of the Baxter family. Even though tragedy and heartache strike this family, they weather through it, leaning on each other and their faith in Jesus. The five books are "Redemption," "Remember," "Return," "Rejoice," and "Reunion."

For those looking for a nonfiction book, try "The Da Vinci Deception" by Erwin W. Lutzer. In the best selling novel "The Da Vinci Code," author Dan Brown blurs the lines between history and fiction, leaving readers to wonder 'Could this be true?'
