





In November turkeys everywhere are wishing they were chickens.

How many people wish they were somebody else? Perhaps some of you reading this devotion are wishing you were somebody else too. As we look around at our lives, we may not feel there is all that much to get excited about. Most likely we will have a Thanksgiving gathering with family and/or friends in a few weeks. We'll probably enjoy a great meal, play games or do something outdoors. But what should we be thankful for?

Sickness, struggles in school, sadness at home or maybe a loved one who is a soldier in Afghanistan and absent from the family are leaving you a little or lot ungrateful. These things and much more are part of the complicated lives we lead. They force us to go on a trip that seems to offer more detours than delights. If we catch ourselves thinking we have little (or nothing) to be thankful for, it's time we take inventory. We could compare ourselves to prisoners, those confined to bed in a nursing home or victims of abuse or crime. Then we might be grateful for what we do not have. I suggest we focus on the positives in our lives versus the lack of negatives. We could try a simple exercise to see some of the many, everyday blessings we already have. As we say each letter of the alphabet, we can think about something(s) God lovingly provides.

A is for America, angels, apples, ankles, animals...

B is for Bible, books, bed, butterflies, balls...

C is for Christmas/Christ, college, cake, cars, cardinals...and so on.

We'll probably find, as others have, that each letter easily suggest more than one or two items or people, or situations in life. So by the time you finish this exercise (and I hope you will) and share it with family and friends, you will realize how many blessings we all enjoy. Our Savior God provides so much for us forgiven sinners, we just have to sit down and count sometimes to better appreciate his goodness in our lives. And that is what our Thanksgiving celebration is really all about. Another Thanksgiving Day this month and our thoughtful, prayerful inventory will not solve all our hurts and problems. It takes something more powerful, more promising. The sole solution to life's challenges, to life's struggles is found and reported to us on the pages of God's Love Letter, the Bible. Our dear Lord and Savior Jesus is more powerful and promising than any problem or pain at any point in our lives. He offers perfect peace for people like you or me. Check out God's Love Letter each day with family and friends. Investigate God's choicest blessings showered upon our lives, our community, our church. I Need More MONEY:



Someone once asked John D. Rockefeller, "How much money is enough?" "Just a little more," he answered. At the time, he was one of the wealthiest men in the world.

Those who've heard that story and Rockefeller's answer, usually divide into two groups: they either think of him as a greedy miser ("He's got more money than he knows what to do with!") or an honest prag-

matist ("Hey, he's just telling the truth—even if you're rich, a little more is always nice."). Don't we all occasionally find ourselves thinking, "I need more money"?

There's nothing wrong with financial security, but how much is enough? If you're pricing a vacation home in Florida and feel frustrated that you don't have enough to buy a Ferrari too, that's one thing. If you lost your job and can't pay the bills, and it's getting tough to put food on the table, that's something else.


This is a complicated issue. It's not easy to properly distinguish between real needs and selfish greed. Do you really need more money? Maybe. Maybe not. When it comes to finances, the best advice comes from Jesus Christ. Our Savior once said, "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:19-21).

According to Jesus, a lot of folks expend an enormous amount of time and energy in pursuit of earthly treasure and financial security, but for what? In the end, if a bad economy, a poor decision, or unforeseen disaster doesn't claim it, time certainly will—you can't take it with you.

That makes heaven the only worthwhile investment. And here's the great news: Jesus lived, died, and rose again to provide all the heavenly treasure for you. Peace with God—now and forever—that's what he freely gives.

Put your trust in Jesus and find in him real treasure and eternal security. What more do you need? Besides, Christians know that the Lord will always provide. We've got his Word on that: "Do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well" (Matthew 6:31-33).

Do you really need more money? You don't need to answer that question. Put your trust in Christ—seek first his kingdom and his righteousness—and let him answer that one for you.

Health Project Coordinator Needed in Mexico

Recently, Jason Paltzer, Director of Kingdom Workers Lutheran Health Alliance (LHA), conducted a health assessment in Mahahual, Mexico. The Confessional Evangelical Lutheran Church (IELC) of Mexico, which is in fellowship with WELS, has a mission there.

Based on Mr. Paltzer's assessment, LHA is looking for a **Project Coordinator for the** "**Healthy Families of Mahahual**" project, which aims to improve the existing health conditions within an area of Mahahual called Kilometer 55 (KM 55). KM 55 is a low economic area with limited health resources, poor sanitation and water quality. The project coordinator, along with the local pastor, will collaborate with community leaders and families to create healthier families and to build relationships as a bridge to the gospel. This project coordinator opportunity is for six months to one year, beginning in February 2014.

Recipe Corner Pilgrim Hat Cookies



Here's a treat that you can easily make with your children or grandchildren!

Ingredients:

24 chocolate-striped shortbread cookies 12-ounce package of chocolate chips 24 marshmallows tube of yellow decorators' frosting

Instructions

- 1. Set the chocolate-striped cookies stripes down on a wax-paper-covered tray, chocolate side up.
- 2. Melt the chocolate chips in a microwave, stirring every 10 seconds until melted.
- One at a time, stick a toothpick into a marshmallow, dip the marshmallow into the melted chocolate, and center it atop a cookie.
- 4. Using a second toothpick to lightly hold down the marshmallow, carefully pull out the first toothpick.
- 5. Chill the hats until the chocolate sets, then pipe a yellow frosting buckle on the front of each hat.

Makes 24 cookies.
